In 1960, Morris James and some staff members changed the look of the Freddie Bird. The district hired a commercial artist to

create a new look for the Freddie Bird "not an eagle, not a cardinal, but a tough looking



bird" according to an article written by Judy Divelbiss. The 1960 version of the Freddie Bird was used for a long time.

The Athletic Director at the time, Kirk Manns, was in charge of getting a new scoreboard. We believe the first time



the Freddie Muscle Bird appeared was on that scoreboard.

Finally, our current Freddie Bird, is an updated 1960s-1970s version.

Along the way there have been many costume variations and presentational styles. We also have had several students over the years represent the district as the Freddie Bird mascot at various school and community events.

One thing is for sure- each time you see the Freddie Bird, whether on apparel, a coffee cup, or in print, a feeling of pride emerges.

When I entered the district as the new superintendent in August 2019, I was immediately drawn to the Freddie Bird spirit. Over the past two years, we have launched various positivity initiatives showcasing our Freddie Bird. This has included our positivity award given to staff, Freddie t-shirts for staff, and the launch of the Freddie Flocking.

FREDERICKTOWN VILLAGE REPORT

Due to the onset of COVID-19 in 2020, the Fredericktown Senior Citizens Group was facing an unprecedented challenge in keeping up with the ongoing maintenance and repair costs associated with the Senior Citizens' Center, which is located adjacent to the Fredericktown Municipal Building, at 2 E. Sandusky Street. For the past several years, Council had been exploring opportunities in an effort to move Council meetings to a roomier and more inviting venue, where the public could sit comfortably and participate in their local government firsthand by attending their Council Meetings.

Since being elected in 2015, Mayor Day had worked out of a seemingly hidden office located at 11 ½ E. Sandusky Street, directly behind both the Brickhouse Grind and the Fredericktown Historical Museum. Most residents had no idea the Mayor's Office even existed and it was an inconvenient and far out-of-the-way location for the Mayor and for those that wanted to visit with him. This spring, Mayor Day and Council agreed to sell the Mayor's

Caramel Apple Cheesecake

Total Time: Prep: 45 min. Bake: 50 min. + chilling

Ingredients

1-1/2 c. cinnamon graham cracker crumbs
3/4 c. sugar, divided
1/4 c. butter, melted
1 package (14 oz) caramels
2/3 c. evaporated milk
1/2 c. chopped pecans, divided
2 packages (8 oz) cream cheese, softened
2 tbsp all-purpose flour, divided
2 lg eggs, lightly beaten
1-1/2 c chopped peeled apples
1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon

Directions

1. Place a greased 9-in. springform pan on a double thickness of heavy-duty foil (about 18 in. square). Securely wrap foil around pan.

2. In a small bowl, combine the cracker crumbs, 1/4 cup sugar and butter. Press onto the bottom and 1 in. up the sides of prepared pan. Place on a baking sheet. Bake at 350° for 10 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool on a wire rack.

3. In a heavy saucepan over medium-low heat, cook and stir caramels and milk until melted and smooth. Pour 1 cup over crust; sprinkle with 1/4 cup pecans. Set remaining caramel mixture aside.

4. In a large bowl, beat the cream cheese, 1 tablespoon flour and remaining sugar until smooth. Add eggs; beat on low speed just until combined. Combine the apples, cinnamon and remaining flour; fold into cream cheese mixture. Pour into crust.

5. Place springform pan in a large baking pan; add 1 in. of hot water to larger pan. Bake for 40 minutes. Reheat reserved caramel mixture if necessary; gently spoon over cheesecake. Sprinkle with remaining pecans.

6. Bake 10-15 minutes longer or until center is just set. Remove pan from water bath. Cool on a wire rack for 10 minutes. Carefully run a knife around edge of pan to loosen; cool 1 hour longer. Refrigerate overnight. Remove sides of pan.

THE TOWNSHIPS OF 43019

The History that Helped Shape Our Community



Berlin Township. Established on June 4, 1822. It was named after Berlin, Connecticut. Before becoming its own township Berlin was a part of Wanye township. Henry Markley was part of the first settlers there in 1808 from Bedford County, Pennsylvania. In 1809 just a year after the first settlers Amos Royce, a veteran of the war of 1812, was appointed as the first Justice of the Peace. Amos Royce assisted in the building of the Block house in Mansfield. Two rather important towns were once located in Berlin Township. The towns were Palmyra in 1835 and Ankenytown in 1844. Palmyra was a bustling town which is known for being a coach stop between Fredericktown and Mansfield. Palmyra was the perfect coach stop due to its location just south of the Knox-Richland County line.

Palmyra started to lose its popularity due to the arrival of the C&O/ B&O railroad in Ankenytown. Ankenytown finally developed itself into a village once the C&O/ B&O railroad built one of its many stations there. Home to several churches, stores, houses, and even a post office, Ankenytown was an ideal place to stay. Ankenytown today still has a church, grange hall, and many of its original homes. In 1815 the first church was built near Ankenytown and near that time the first school was built in the Fredericktown area. Berlin Township's main attractions are its several ancient mound works (Ellis Willit Farm) and also known for being the boundary of the " Greenville Treaty Line."





FDIC

Middlebury Township. Established on December 3, 1823 and named after Middlebury, Vermont, this township is the youngest of the townships in Fredericktown. William Farquar, who later became a judge in Knox County, was among the first settlers from Frederick, Maryland. The first justice of the peace was James Johnson in 1824. Another notable settler was Thomas Townsend. Thomas lived in Middlebury in 1808 and kept an underground railroad at one point. Like Berlin, Middlebury had two important towns. The first town was Waterford. Waterford was established on November 25, 1841. The first settler was Josiah Fawcett.

ACKERMAN NATURE PRESERVE

Fredericktown's Most Popular (Yet Unknown) Tourist Attraction



If you park on Salem Avenue Extension, next to the Ackerman Nature Preserve, it would be unlikely to find a local friend, but highly likely that you would see a license plate from another county or even other state. Why would someone be at the Ackerman Nature Preserve?

During the recent pandemic, the observation of birds , commonly known as birding, became a very popular activity around the nation. Birding was an activity that allowed for exploration, excitement, and was a way to practice social distancing. Birding became a perfect hobby for those who enjoy nature, the joy of discovery, travel and exploring unique locations.

Birders enjoy not only seeing birds, but studying their interactions and habits. Birds are constantly on the move from location to location and from region to region. Many birders enjoy observing birds through binoculars or scopes. Others enjoy capturing birds through the lens of a camera.



Birders often document their finds from their backyards and beyond, and categorize them as a first (ever) observation, known in the birding community as a lifer, or by the number of birds that are found in a year or even a lifetime. Birders that compare their sightings in a year often run the totals into the hundreds. In 2011, Steve Martin gave birding a greater awareness through the movie, "The Big Year." Birding is very popular among the Amish community, who regularly enjoy contests, not only on how many birds are viewed or heard during a period, but by the means of transportation used to get to the location. The transportation varies from horse and buggy, bicycle, ebike or vehicle.

Birders communicate their finds on the internet through Facebook postings. A popular site followed by most birders around the world is eBird, found at www.ebird.org. The Ackerman Nature Preserve's eBird site can be found at

https://ebird.org/hotspot/L3536376? yr=all&m=&rank=mrec, with eBirders logging 154 species at that location. Cornell University, the creator of eBird, also maintains a Knox County eBird page at https://ebird.org/region/US-OH-083? yr=all&m=&rank=mrec which includes 59 hotspots.



Sightings are posted on the various eBird locations to let other birders know what was located at a particular location. Birds are sometimes in a particular location for a short period of time, maybe less than a day. Birders sometimes travel at a moment's notice to see a particular species. Seeing and documenting a "lifer" is an exhilarating experience. Returning to Fredericktown's own aviary jewel, on June 26, 2021 one local birder posted 24 species of birds at the Ackerman Nature Preserve. His findings included the beautiful three season wood duck, the stoic great blue heron and the long-necked great white egret. For most Fredericktown residents, driving by the Ackerman Nature Preserve that day, nothing would have been noticed. Local residents may want to do a regular check of the eBird website to see what is at Ackerman, and to understand why there are so many visitors in the community.

Once the interest in birding has been discovered, an Ackerman Nature Preserve visit will likely be followed by a visit to Knox Lake, Mohican State Park, as well as the Funk Bottoms Wildlife Area and the wetlands near Wilderness Road in Wayne County. These hotspots, along with 4011 others, are among the popular birding spots in Ohio.

Once the interest in birding has been discovered, an Ackerman Nature Preserve visit will likely be followed by a visit to Knox Lake, Mohican State Park, as well as the Funk Bottoms Wildlife Area and the wetlands near Wilderness Road in Wayne County. These hotspots, along with 4011 others, are among the popular birding spots in Ohio.

For the migrating bird, Ackerman Nature Preserve is a popular spot to rest and refuel, and sometimes to take up residence. Ackerman is remote, appears safe from animal predators, and contains an ample food supply for the aviary short-stay visitors and the year long residents.

During the fall and spring migration seasons, the preserve provides an opportunity to see many different species of birds, often changing daily. Birders from throughout Ohio, and beyond, will be at the site on most days to add to their birding lists. Visitors to the area most certainly will have an impact on the local economy as purchases are made in the community.



While the Ackerman Preserve, in its natural state, is an excellent birding location, it has the ability to be an attraction to visitors across the nation and even the world. For the wildlife, adding an aeration system would keep the water from freezing in the winter, with open water being necessary for birds to maintain a healthy metabolism. This feature would also enhance the attractiveness of the preserve. For the human observers, adding cover through strategically-located and accessible bird blinds would enhance the ability to observe wildlife without interruption and thus increase the desirability of the location. The addition of a parking lot would enhance the visitor experience.





Take some time to check out eBird and then grab the binoculars and visit the Ackerman Nature Preserve. Look to the rear (south side) of the preserve as this is where birds typically find shelter. If lucky, you may see a species of waterfowl closer to the shore. Make sure you have a bird identification book by your side, or use an app on your phone, and check off your observations. You will be amazed at the waterfowl guests that find Fredericktown a great place to visit, along with birders from all over Ohio and beyond. You will be amazed at what you have been missing!

The second town was called Batementown, and was named after Luther Batemen. Batementown was established in 1815, but sadly was not successful. The first College in the area was opened by Rev. Robert Morrison and brother William Morrison. They called their college "Westminster Academy. This college grew out of a division of the Presbyterian church which was on the subject of slavery. And finally on October 25, 1836 their first Post office was opened.

Morris Township. Laid out in March of 1812. Morris township was first settled in 1804 by William Douglas and was named after Morris County, New Jersey. In 1807 in a community called Clinton the first store was opened. Later on James Loveridge came to clear some land for an orchard and hired Johnny Appleseed to plant the trees. The township was well known for its Whiskey making and made it an ideal place to buy and trade. The Whiskey maker who started it all was named Simon Carpenter. In 1812 during the famous war the township started its first school, and their first teacher was named Ichabod Marshall. During 1812 the first justice of the Peace was elected and that was John Trimble, Benjamin Barney, & Joseph Coleman.



Wayne Township. The final and oldest of the townships is Wayne Township. The area's first inhabitants were the Moundbuilders, then the "Red Indians" and then the Delaware, Wyandot, Greentown and Jerometown Indians. Nathaniel Young was the first settler to the area. He came to the area in 1805. It was noted that he lived with the Indians and was a self made blacksmith - known by the Indians as "Axe Maker." Mr. Young lived in an area called "Jersey Settlement" - later known as "Lucerne." John Kerr opened the first mill in 1807. Wayne Township was formally established in 1808 and named after "Mad Anthony Wayne, a Stoney Point and Fallen Timbers hero.

The first road between Mt. Vernon and Fredericktown was opened in the area in 1809. William, John & Elihaet Lewis started the "Wayne Baptist Church" in 1810. This was the first church to open outside of Fredericktown. The church met in a home and in 1815 erected it's first building. The church held no Sunday School service because the Lewises did not like the idea. Once heavily populated by Indians, the area tribes left following the War of 1812. A second church was established in the area in 1830 called the "Salem Methodist Church." No mention was made of a school in Wayne Townships during this time.
