As the end of another year draws near, we, at the Fredericktown Community Development Foundation would like to take this opportunity to thank the Fredericktown Community and all of those who so generously supported our efforts in 2021. It is because of you that we have been able to successfully implement so many programs to promote our community and our businesses.

Despite a history that had been 40 years in the making, the Fredericktown Community Development Foundation (aka: the FCDF) found itself at a transitional point in late 2019. This business league/organization was forced to reconsider its mission and relevance in this new era. As the organization entered into 2020, restructuring began and the organization sought a re-designation as a 501c3 (public charity) organization that would enable it to continue providing support to our businesses, residents and the community as a whole. This designation would allow the organization to raise awareness and secure funding that would enable our dynamic community to embrace economic development and tourism thus paving the way for Fredericktown to succeed for generations to come. By the end of 2020, the organization had completed it's restructuring and had a plan in place to hit the ground running in 2021.

While restructuring, rebranding and repositioning all take time, it seems hard to believe how much the FCDF has accomplished in such a short time. In 2021, the FCDF dedicated itself to promoting Fredericktown. A collaboration of volunteer committees focused their efforts on encouraging businesses to consider Fredericktown as an ideal location for operating a business. This group also has worked diligently to find programs that would allow our downtown businesses to make improvements to their buildings and "dress up" the face of our community. As a result, the "Downtown Fredericktown Matching Business Grant Program" was born. Through this program downtown businesses can secure a \$5000 matching grant to make facade improvements to their buildings.

Additionally, the FCDF has successfully introduced "Third Thursdays," a monthly event from May until November that encourages visitors to experience Fredericktown. From "The Fair on the Square" to "Tailgate Parties," these events have generated interest in our community and our businesses. The organization also introduced several annual events, like the 4th of July Celebration and the Fall Harvest Festival, that offer "live" entertainment, food and fun for the entire family. Each of these events was carefully planned to allow visitors to truly "experience" Fredericktown.

### **Solar Energy - What You Should Know**

#### "Does Solar work in Ohio?"

Is a common question in our area while we see many new solar panels systems popping up throughout our area.

The answer is "YES" it most certainly does works. Solar does not need heat just sun to produce electricity. Solar panels can produce energy even on cloudy day.

What is solar? Solar Photovoltaic (PV) technology, otherwise known as solar energy technologies, basically converts light into electricity. A single PV device is known as a solar cell and is usually small in size. Single solar cells produce only a few watts of energy. Connecting several solar cells together forms a larger unit called a solar panel or a solar module.

Benefits of Microinverters - allow the DC to be converted to AC at the panel. Results in a safer and more efficient install.

Solar panels can be mounted on houses, garages, barns or ground mounts can be used. South then west facing exposure is best.

**Net Metering**- With Net Metering you are still hooked up to the electric grid. Any excess energy you produce goes back to the grid in a form of a credit when your meter runs backwards. If you need to pull from the grid, for example, on a rainy day the meter will run forward and charge you for what you need less your credits.

#### **Benefits of Solar:**

- Reduce electrical consumption from the grid
- Produce what electric you and your family need and be energy independent.
- Go Green with clean energy

#### **Current Incentives:**

- \$0 down payment to qualified buyer. Look for loans that offer ZERO financing fees.
- 26% Federal Tax Rebate based on your tax liability.
- Grants and financing for rural/farms for qualified buyers
- Solar is NOT free and back up batteries are NOT free through any kind of government program.

### How do you find out if solar will benefit you and your family?

- Contact a local solar company for a free evaluation.
- A copy of your current electric bill with the last 12 months history of usage is used to determine the size

solar panel system you need.

- Your quote can be designed with various offsets and kW size.
- Quote should use a national weather data base to predict the weather in your area based on the previous
   5 years of weather history.
- Quote should show estimated solar production, energy usage from the solar and the grid for up to 25 years.
- Your savings with or without financing should be included in your quote to determine your breakeven point.
- Caution when purchasing solar:

**System % offset.** For example, 40% offset means your solar is only sized to offset 40% of your current kWh demand. Then means you will still need 60% of your electric from the electric company.



Your goal is 80-100% offset. Your electric company will only allow you to install up to 100% of your current usage. Producing over 120% offset the electric companies will assume you are making power to sell which can put you into a lower pay back.

• False offsets - Assigning a % of offset to LED light bulbs, wrapping your hot water tank and other energy efficient items.

Many companies will assign 25% offset to these items whether you already have them in your home or not. There is no true way to put an offset to these items since every home is different

 Do your research on backup batteries. Many backup batteries can only bank enough energy to last 3-8 hours depending on what you are running and the size of battery you install. Running an A/C unit or a well pump would deplete the saved energy very fast. Also, many of these batteries will need sunlight to recharge.

### FIRES FROM FREDERICKTOWN'S PAST

Part 1 (The Fires of 1875 and 1913)

Fredericktown has had its share of fires in the 214 years since its founding. Over the years, five major fires devastated the village. The history of these fires will be presented in 2 parts, due to the amount of information available on each and the space constraints in the 43019 publication. In Part 1, we chronicle the fires of 1875 and 1913.

#### The Fire of 1875

There is not much information about this fire except that it started in the rear of one of the wood-sided businesses on the west side of Main Street. The cause of the fire was never determined, but it was believed to have been arson. While no names were ever mentioned, the individuals suspected of being the arsonists moved out of the village after the fire, never to return.

The fire destroyed the businesses on the west side of Main Street between West College Street and an alleyway that ran west between the current location of the office of Dr. Burns and the Park National Bank. At the time, wooden buildings housing the Dean Woods hardware store were located at the current Park National Bank site. The fire ignited those buildings and then continued north to First Street to where the new First Knox National Bank was built.

The fire was able to spread rapidly due to the lack of a formal fire department. A bucket brigade of local citizens rallied to carry water from the river up Mill Street to fight the fire. Although a valiant effort was put forth, the well-established fire spread faster than those fighting it could quench the flames.

After the fire, the village leader had cisterns constructed near the downtown area to hold water for fire control. In addition, a firehouse was built and was manned by a well-trained group of local men to avoid the difficulties that arose while fighting the fire of 1875.



#### The Fire of 1913

This fire destroyed almost the entire East Side of Main Street. The only building not destroyed was the Davis & Dague grocery store, now the Homestead Restaurant. What saved the building was a special fire wall that was installed on the north side of the building during construction in 1899. Both Davis and Dague remembered the fire of 1875 and were determined to protect their business from another such disaster.

At 1:30 pm on the afternoon of Friday, August 29, 1913, the unthinkable happened. A fire had been reported in the rear of the Lewis and Ward clothing store. The fire raced north through the area, destroying all the businesses between the Davis & Dague grocery store and First Street. In total, nine businesses with a combined total of \$50,000 in structures and inventory were lost. The extent of the loss was so significant because fireman dispatched to fight the fire were unable to gain access to the rear of the clothing store where the fire had started.

To avoid a similar situation from happening again, the business owners dedicated a strip of land at the rear of the buildings for fire access when the block was rebuilt in 1914. This strip of land is now named Gift Alley because it was given to the village as a gift from the business owners who had lost property in the fire.

Following the fire, criticism of the fire department for the lack of leadership and organization resulted in the hiring of a Fire Chief to oversee and organize any response to subsequent fires.

Side Note: According to one source, the boy standing beside the bicycle in the picture on the right was Si Blackburn, who was one day to become the Mayor of Fredericktown.

#### FREDERICKTOWN VILLAGE REPORT

The Village of Fredericktown Service Department currently has approximately 200 tons of road salt on hand as we wait for the arrival of our first accumulating snowfall this winter. When we experience snowfall in excess of two inches, please avoid parking vehicles on village streets whenever possible. The Service Department can plow streets far more safely and effectively without navigating around parked vehicles. Furthermore, it is not possible to plow around vehicles without piling snow around them in the process, and this makes it more difficult for residents to move those vehicles.

Vehicles parked on any village street may be parked a maximum of forty-eight hours without moving. When parking on North Main Street, between Sandusky Street and Mill Street, please remember that vehicles may be parked no longer than three hours without moving (from 8 AM to 5 PM) and during winter months, parking downtown is prohibited from midnight to 6 AM. Plowing snow is hazardous, particularly after dark, and the risk of vehicle accidents increases



substantially as street conditions worsen. Also, please never follow a plow truck closely, as they back up often and they likely cannot see vehicles following closely behind them. Finally, streets generally are not plowed as heavily between the hours of midnight and 4 AM, so please use extreme caution when travelling on snowy/icy village streets in early morning hours.

The most common snow-related complaint we receive at the Village Office is that our plow trucks are plowing driveways closed. Unfortunately, there is no way to prevent pushing snow into the entrances of driveways when we plow snow from the streets. In no way does our staff enjoy burying driveway entrances, especially after residents have plowed their driveways, but it is simply unavoidable and we apologize in advance for burying virtually every driveway entrance throughout the village each time we plow. Our primary goal in plowing and salting village streets will always be to keep streets passable by safely plowing and/or salting in the most cost-effective manner.

Mayor, Village Council, and staff would like to wish our residents and local merchants a safe and prosperous 2022. 🍎

### **CRAZY CARL'S SPICY CHILI (BUT NOT ALOT)**


#### By: Carl Navarro - Best Overall Chili at the Fall Harvest Festival

### **TouchPointe Celebrates 12 Years**

After a combined 65 years in public education, Dan Humphrey retired as Fredericktown Superintendent and his wife, Barb, retired as a Mount Vernon English Language Arts teacher. Forming a faith-based non-profit was not immediately on their radar as something to do in retirement, but within less than a year, TouchPointe Marriage and Family Resources was a reality for the cofounders.

Being involved in education, the Humphreys saw firsthand the effects of broken relationships in the home. Healthy families became a passion for the couple. The Humphreys, who volunteer their time, thought they would work with a few couples to enrich marriages; but 12 years later, they have met with over 300 couples. Dan & Barb have shared tools to improve communication, tools to resolve conflict peacefully, and tools to help couples build strong emotional connections. They work with pre-marital couples, first marriages, second and third marriages, co-habitating couples, and regularly get referrals from the Mount Vernon Municipal Court for selected firsttime domestic violence offenders.

Little did the Humphreys know in 2010 when the organization was founded, that it would grow into a vibrant, well respected asset serving the community from both the Fredericktown office and a location in Mount Vernon at 400 S. Gay. In 2020 during the height of the Covid pandemic, TouchPointe served nearly 500 individuals with two paid staff and a team of 12-15 volunteers.

Fredericktown resident Jessica Reynolds serves as the Executive Director and works from the Mount Vernon office along with part-time Administrative Assistant, Patty Miller, also a Freddie! Reynolds, in addition to other responsibilities, is the driving force behind KnoxWorks, the employment component of TouchPointe. This program

Find Us on Facebook and Instagram for New Items and Special Promotions helps men and women get back on their feet after coming from poverty, jail/prison, or recovering from an addiction. Reynolds teaches a three day class once a month to men and women, who are willing and capable, to help them get and keep a job. She works closely with "Core Employers" who are willing to give men and women a second chance. Such employers include Ver-Mac Industries, Knox Community Hospital, Kokosing Construction, and others.

TouchPointe works with all three of the Knox County Courts and provides programming, called Get on Track, for men and women on probation. Larry Andrzejewski and Betty Wade, both Fredericktown area residents, volunteer their time to meet with inmates at the Knox County Jail on a weekly basis. Dale and Janet Anthony, also Freddies who volunteer, provide Parent Talk for parents who are struggling with the behavior of their children. Other volunteers work oneon-one with individuals and will often use materials called Relational Healing, which looks at the root causes of behavior.

Barb has had training through the American Association of Christian Counselors, but is not a licensed counselor; nor are any of the volunteers or paid staff. TouchPointe provides coaching; and listening is a key component of what the staff and volunteers are trained to do. As part of a grant, TouchPointe has a licensed counselor that comes once a month to provide training and to help debrief the staff and volunteers.

TouchPointe is one of the few faith-based organizations that collaborate with local government and agencies serving the people of Knox and surrounding counties. The organization is funded primarily by donations from local individuals, churches, and corporations. TouchPointe has received local grants from the Ariel Foundation, Knox County Foundation, Food for the Hungry, Energy Coop's Project Round-Up, and Consolidated Electric's People's Fund.

A call for oral history participants

#### ARE YOU A PAST OR CURRENT RESIDENT OF FREDERICKTOWN?

Kenyon College history professor Dr. Melissah Pawlikowski invites you to contribute to two upcoming oral history projects in partnership with the Fredericktown's Economic Development Committee, the Fredericktown Historical Museum and the Free Press Museum. Kenyon students enrolled in the courses "History of North American Indians" and "United States History After 1877" will study the collected information in combination with secondary sources to connect these local histories with the greater American historical narrative by writing two articles featured in issues of 43019 magazine.

#### PROJECT 1: MOUNDBUILDERS OF FREDERICKTOWN: THE ADENA MOUNDS

The Adena mounds are the subject of our first project, "Fredericktown: A cultural center of the Adena world." In visiting Fredericktown, the history and place of the Adena peoples is made immediately evident by the landscape. In conversations with residents, it becomes clear that this early indigenious history is a source of pride — that slivers of Adena history circulate in living memory and are preserved in both oral history and family documents. Beyond local history, emerging scholarship suggests the early city established by the Adena developed into a population and trade center. Just below the surface of modern Fredericktown was a one-time significant, sophisticated, Adena metropolis.

The goal of this project is to reconstruct the location of removed mounds and preserve the local knowledge of the mounds for future scholars. The story of Fredericktown's first people is one of significance to the North American historical narrative if not the narrative of early humankind.

#### PROJECT 2: THE POLIO EPIDEMIC OF THE 1950S

By 1960, polio had limited the physical abilities or killed just under a half a million people around the world. Despite the relative distance from larger cities Fredericktown's rural location did not shield residents from the array of devistations and tolls hitting towns across the country. The emergence of an activist for people with physical disabilities, Julianna R "Julie" Cochran Rogers, is one lasting experience distinctive to the Fredericktown experience, but it is clear, and understandable, that the polio epidemic stands out in the cultural memory of the residents of Fredericktown.

**The goal of this project is to collect local oral histories and local newspaper articles.** This information will then used in combination with secondary research and critical thinking to reconstruct the history of the polio epidemic in Fredericktown during the 1950s. Using their research, students will share their findings in an article written for 43019 magazine.

#### WE NEED YOUR HELP!

If you are interested in participating in one or both oral history projects, please respond to as many of the following questions as you feel comfortable, to the best of your ability. Partial information or information you may not fully understand may take on greater meaning when analyzed by students in combination with additional primary and secondary source information. Your answers can be any length. Don't worry if it is not a story with a start or an end. Even bullet points will provide students with a trail to follow after. Across the community, others may fill gaps.

By participating, you give permission for your information to be used for historical research. Participants may opt to maintain anonymity by stating in the first line of your response that you do not want your name to be published or the details shared.

#### INTERVIEW QUESTIONS FOR THE ADENA MOUNDS

- 1. Do you recall the location of any removed mounds?
- 2. When the mounds were removed do you recall if anything was found inside them?
- 3. What purpose did the removed mounds serve for the Adena people? If you know specific mounds and purposes please identify them. (i.e., The mound on Main Street was used as a boundary line.)
- 4. Are there mounds on your property that you would like to have included in this project? What stories do you know relating to those mounds?
- 5. Do you have any family papers, letters, photos or other materials that refer to the mounds or mounds' history? What information do they share?
- 6. What stories do you remember being told about the mounds?

- 1. Are we allowed to use your name in connection with the information you are sharing with us?
- 2. What year were you born?

- 5. Were you diagnosed with polio? Or were you tested for polio? Do you have memories of that experience or other details you want to share?
- 6. If you knew anyone diagnosed with polio, what do you remember about that experience?
- 7. During the 1950s, what did you think or feel about polio in general?
- 8. What did you think or feel about the creation of the polio vaccine?
- 9. If you or your children were vaccinated, do you remember about when? What did you remember about that experience? If you were not vaccinated but remember others being vaccinated, do you have memories pertaining to not being vaccinated?
- 10. What do you remember about the community response to polio? How did people respond? What was the general feeling?
- 11. Is there anything you want to add or a story you want to share that we have not asked about?



Lionism in Fredericktown began on May 16, 1938 in the Del Mar Hotel with 24 charter members and Hal Walters as its first president. Soon after its very beginning, the club adopted the motto it has always followed, "It can be done in a small town" along with the Lions International motto, "We serve." These two mottos have given the Fredericktown Lions the vision, creativity and willingness to take on projects which sometimes have seemed to be impossible to accomplish.

For the past 83 years, the Lions Club has completed, contributed to or helped to complete many projects in the Fredericktown community. Some of these projects including: building Merrin Park including the ball diamond, the helter houses, the basketball court and the tennis court; the building of the football stadium on Taylor Street; the building of the football stadium and track at the High School, the building of the shelter houses at Community Park; and the building of the Community Library. In addition. The Lions Club has done many things for the school including: sponsor athletic and band trips, athletic and honor society banquets, the Good Program and have purchased hundreds of eyeglasses for students. The Lions Club has sponsored the Boy Scouts and an activity for Halloween ever since it began in 1938. In addition, the Lions Club has contributed over \$25,000 to the major Lions International projects throughout the United Stated and in countries all over the world.

To provide funds for these projects, many activities have been tried. One of the most successful was a grand drawing after WWII, which had a 1946 Ford car as the main drawing. This endeavor netted over \$14,000 and led to the establishment that is now Merrin Park. Another successful project was selling box lunches at the Farm Science Review. The Lions Club also held its chicken barbeque at Merrin Park for 25 years at Merrin Park Labor Day celebration beginning in 1952 and the brat stand at the Fourth of July and Tomato Show events. All the money raised from these projects have been used for projects in the Fredericktown Community or have been used for Lions Club International projects.

By using the two mottos, "It can be done in a small town" and "We serve," the Lions Club has helped to make Fredericktown a better community in which to live.
